School staff are not rostered to supervise students during this time, as they are involved in meetings and planning. If a child needs to be dropped off before 8:45am in a one-off situation, supervision can be arranged by prior agreement with the school staff. Students who regularly arrive before 8:45am need to be booked into Before School Care with TheirCare.

Protecting children & young people from abuse is our responsibility



The Child Safe Standards are compulsory minimum standards for all Victorian schools to ensure they are well prepared to keep children and young people safe and protect them from abuse. The Child Safe Standards include requirements to keep children, young people and students safe. There are eleven Child Safe Standards. Each newsletter we will introduce a one standard keeping you informed of our work supporting and implementing the standards.

Child Safe Standard 5 - Equity and diverse needs

At Mooroopna North PS our work within this standard includes;

The school's Child Safety and Wellbeing Policy supports equity and diverse needs, focusing on students with disabilities, culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds, international students, and LGBTIQ+ students. The school ensures culturally safe, accessible, and easyto-understand child safety information, support, and complaints processes. Additionally, the school has a Bullying Prevention Policy and an Inclusion and Diversity Policy to address diversity and equity.

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We are looking for families of autistic children aged between 7 and 12 years who experience bullying at school to take part in research on a family program

Your paragraph text

Autistic children are more at risk of being bullied at school than their typically developing peers. When children are bullied, parents want to help but are often unsure of what to do. Resilience Triple P was developed to empower parents to help their children handle bullying. This family program teaches children friendship skills and how to respond to bullying and conflict. It also looks at parenting strategies to help children develop their emotional resilience and social problem-solving skills and ways to communicate with schools to encourage an effective response to issues. Resilience Triple P is being trialled by the Parenting and Family Support Centre (University of Queensland) for autistic children.
